To ask the Minister for Health if it is policy in CHO area 7 that access to speech and language therapy for children is not age dependent and that in cases in which a child is assessed as having potential for further improvement that intervention can and will be provided; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

Dear Deputy McGrath,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in regard to your parliamentary question which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position.

Children with Speech and Language Therapy needs aged 0-18 in Dublin South, Kildare and West Wicklow Community Healthcare, access services within Primary Care and Social Care. Early intervention teams will see children until their sixth birthday and then they transfer to School Age Teams.

Intervention for children on Primary Care and Social Care Speech and Language Therapy waiting lists is not agerelated. It is strengths-based and evidence-based. Intervention can be delivered individually or in groups, through parents, educational staff or through home programmes. Some intervention is Speech and Language Therapy specific and some intervention is multi-disciplinary team-based.

There are lengthy waiting lists currently to access some services due to staffing vacancies. However the Health Service Executive is endeavouring to streamline services in an effort to improve access times for all service users.
