PQ 8571/19: To ask the Minister for Health the number public health nurses employed by the HSE in each of the years 2011 to 2018, in tabular form.

Dear Deputy O'Reilly,

I refer to your recent parliamentary question in relation to numbers of personnel employed in the public health service which was forwarded to the HSE by the Department of Health for direct reply.

Firstly, I should point out that staffing figures provided generally relate to direct employment levels as returned through the Health Service Personnel Census (HSPC), which is the official employment count for the public health sector (HSE and Section 38 Voluntary Hospitals & Agencies), however, in this instance I should point out that Public Health Nurses are solely employed by the HSE and not by any Section 38 organisation. Numbers equating to service levels are expressed as whole-time equivalents (WTE) taking account of part-time working, whereas headcount figures give the number of individuals. In order to provide the Deputy with complete information, the response to this question has been expanded to encompass details for all HSE Public Health Nurses including a small number in Hospital Services as well as Community Healthcare Organisations (CHOs).

In relation to the Deputy's central question, at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2018, there were 135,742 personnel (equating to 117,857 WTE) directly employed in the provision of Health and Social Care Services by the HSE and the various Section 38 organisations and of which 1,811 (1,541 WTE) were Public Health Nurses. This represents a 9 WTE fall over the December 2011 figure. Details as requested by the Deputy, by Community Healthcare Area (together with other service areas), are set out in the following table:

The Deputy will also be interested to note that, additionally, there are 1,153 (880 WTE) Staff Nurses & Midwives directly engaged in Primary Care Services and that this represents a 159 WTE increase over the December 2011 figure. Finally, the Deputy will wish to know the total number of nurses working in Primary Care services at 31 December was 1,842 (2,995) and that this represents a 271 WTE increase since 2011.
