## PQ **11888/19** To ask the Minister for Health his plans to assist the estimated 150,000 adults here that may be undiagnosed and untreated for ADHD; and if he will make a statement on the matter - James Browne.

## Dear Deputy Browne,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position.

With response to the PQ outlined above, it might be helpful to explain that the primary reason a Clinical Programme for Adults with ADHD is being developed in the HSE is because of the lack of services. This is a common theme in most European countries, not just Ireland. However HSE Mental Health Services have prioritised the development of a Model of Care for evidenced based services nationally. This was done in response to the now well established facts that:

- 1. ADHD persists in whole or part into adulthood in 60% of children with ADHD
- 2. It can have significantly adverse impact on the person's life

This does mean that in the meantime it can be difficult to get advice or help. It is suggested that nevertheless people do ask their GPs to refer them to their local mental health service. The services have been asked to refer to NICE guidelines 2013, 2018 on the assessment and management of children, adolescents and adults with ADHD for guidance.

This is in place while the roll out of the Model continues in line with PFG funding available.
