Dear Deputy Wynne,

I acknowledge receipt of the above parliamentary question.

I wish to advise that CHO3 have no-one waiting over 3 months for CIPC (Primary Care) counselling.

The waiting times for adults awaiting counselling with the National Adult counselling Service in the Mid West is as follows:

Numbers waiting for counselling NCS (Adults who have experienced past abuse) September 2020

These figures are not typical or representative for a number of reasons. Usually percentages waiting are 60-70% Limerick, 25-35% North Tipperary, 15-20% Clare. Over the last 18 months the Service has received more than the usual number of referrals from Community Mental Health Teams in Clare. These are usually very complex and remain longer in counselling than those who are self-referred, and can lead to stagnant waiting lists in areas affected.

Service staffing is generally allocated on a population basis, with demand by many to be seen outside their own area of residence, preferably in the city, especially if they work or study there.

I trust this clarifies the position.
