PQ 27225 - To ask the Minister for Health the steps being taken by University Hospital Waterford to provide insulin pump therapy as a treatment option to all eligible adults with type 1 diabetes; the plans of the hospital to provide type 1 diabetes self-management education to adults attending its clinic; if the hospital has included the specialist nursing staff and dieticians required to provide insulin pump therapy for adult diabetes services within its budget proposal; if he will fund same; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

Dear Deputy Cullinane

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position.

University Hospital Waterford current focus is on the 'Waterford Thrive with Diabetes Service' Project, supported by Sláintecare Integration Funding 2019/2020. This project is focused on supporting and empowering people with Diabetes Type 1 to thrive with diabetes through the provision of specialist healthcare, support and self-management education, delivered in the main in an appropriate primary care setting.

The main project deliverables include:

- Senior Diabetes Specialist Dietician and Specialist Diabetes CNS -led Dose Adjusted for Normal Eating (DAFNE) Structured Patient Education (SPE)
- Specialist Diabetes Supported Discharge and post-discharge follow-up Service in Primary Care.
- Specialist ambulatory review/support clinics in primary care for target cohorts (e.g. young people transitioning from Paediatric to Adult Services, newly diagnosed patients and patients with poor control).
- Specialist MDT clinic support

Following the establishment of the Thrive with Diabetes Service, it is expected that the service will deliver 8-10 DAFNE programmes annually and additionally will facilitate >1500 patient clinic appointments/encounters in the initial year of service.

Successful delivery of this integrated model of Type1 Diabetes care will demonstrate the potential of continuation of the Waterford Thrive with Diabetes Service, post project completion, and potentially to scale this project to other sites regionally and nationally. Due to the COVID-19 Global Pandemic this Project was temporarily paused in March 2020 however it re-commenced at the start of August 2020.

Since Project re-commencement, a Specialist Diabetes CNS and a Senior Diabetes Specialist Dietician have commenced in new Project posts to progress delivery of the project and operation of planned services from September 2020 to the expected end project date of July 2021. The CNS and Dietician are currently undertaking a DAFNE Educators Programmes, in preparation of delivery of DAFNE programmes to patients, commencing in January 2021.

UHW currently is not in a position to provide insulin pump therapy locally for patients with type 1 diabetes.
