PQ5549/21:To ask the Minister for Health the number of diabetic retina screen tests conducted in each year since the introduction of the National Diabetic Retinal Screening Programme 2014 – 2020, by county in tabular form; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

Dear Deputy,

I refer to the above query.

The table below illustrates the number of Diabetic RetinaScreen tests conducted yearly since the introduction of the National Diabetic Retinal Screening Programme. Unfortunately the programme cannot provide the information by county.

Diabetic RetinaScreen was paused between March and July 2020 in adherence to Government and Public Health advice to stop the spread of COVID-19. When screening commenced, the programme began by sending screening invitations to eligible people, based on programme prioritisation. Invitations were issued to people who were overdue a screening appointment during the paused period, who are now due a screening appointment, who have now become eligible for their first eye screening test and who has joined the programme since March 2020.

Diabetic RetinaScreen continues to invite participants to attend screening and are reporting a high attendance rate for screening. We are working with providers to ensure screening is delivered safely, in line with Public Health guidelines, for staff and participants. All urgent referrals are being seen in the treatment centres.

The programme is continuing to identify opportunities for patient-facing healthcare workers to be scheduled for vaccination, to reduce the risk to participants and staff of COVID-19 and support the continuation services.

Screening is a population health measure for people who are presumed healthy and do not have symptoms. The NSS continues to encourage all people who are between screening appointments, or waiting for rescheduled appointments, to be aware of symptoms. We ask that those people contact their GP, who will arrange appropriate follow-up care.
