Dear Deputy Connolly,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Questions, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for responses.

The National Ambulance Service publishes reports on response times of 18 minutes 59 seconds and the average response times for 'Category 1' calls by division and region. 'Category 1' refers to a life-threatening conditions requiring immediate intervention and/or resuscitation. For example, cardiac or respiratory arrest; airway obstruction; ineffective breathing; and unconscious patient with abnormal breathing etc.



The West Division are comprised of three regions with the West counties encompassing Galway, Mayo and Roscommon.

The average response times for 'Category 1' calls for the West for 2018 was 20 minutes, in 2019 it was 19 minutes, for 2020 it was 20 minutes and the published figures to date for 2021 (January and February) is 22 minutes. The percentage of 'Category 1' calls responded to within 18 minutes 59 seconds for 2018 was 60%, 61% for 2019, 61% for 2020 and for the first two months of 2021 it is 56%.

The Chief Ambulance Office for the Division has a meeting scheduled on 19th April 2021 with the Connemara Ambulance Crisis Group. If there are any reports circulated at that meeting by the National Ambulance Service we will of course furnish you with a copy of same.
