Dear Deputy Kelly,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position.

Hydrocephalus is a chronic, neurological condition caused by an abnormal accumulation of cerebrospinal fluid (CSF) within cavities of the brain called ventricles, resulting in pressure on the brain. It is important to note that hydrocephalus can be a component of Acquired brain injury but not necessarily "akin to it".

People can have hydrocephalus for example congenital hydrocephalus) be treated and not necessarily have an acquired brain injury.

More commonly though because of the nature and causes of acquired brain injury certain types of brain injury may be complicated by the development of hydrocephalus as a consequence of brain injury and as such people with acquired brain injury and hydrocephalus require treatment and management of that and may require a neurosurgical procedure to manage.
