PQ 30133/22 To ask the Minister for Health the number of staff vacancies which currently exist in occupational therapy, physiotherapy, speech and language therapy and psychology; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

Dear Deputy Cullinane,

I refer to your recent parliamentary question in relation to staffing which was forwarded to the Health Services Executive (HSE) by the Department of Health for direct reply.

The Deputy will be interested to note that given the size and complexity of the health services, staff are recruited by local services, through national recruitment initiatives and through external agencies by the HSE and Section 38 Voluntary Hospitals and agencies. In addition, the HSE also has on-going international recruitment campaigns, which take place in a competitive environment against global shortages of health professionals. Recruitment activities are undertaken to fill both vacancies and new service development posts.

However, the HSE does not centrally track all this recruitment activity, undertaken by a variety of stakeholders across the organisation. Instead, through our planning process, we utilise the staff turnover rate, which is in the order of 6.8% overall for the HSE, to plan for the replacement of these staff across our services, incorporated into our overall planning for recruitment of not only replacement posts, but equally our new service development posts.

Employment levels at the end of April 2022, show there were 134,573 WTE (equating to 151,836 personnel) directly employed in the provision of Health & Social Care Services and of which:

- 1.4% (1,873 WTE, 2,114 personnel) were Occupational Therapists. This figure represents a 17.1% (274 WTE, 304 personnel) increase over December 2019.
- 1.6% (2,169 WTE, 2,506 personnel) were Physiotherapists. This figure represents a 17.2% (318 WTE, 343 personnel) increase over December 2019.
- 0.9% (1,216 WTE, 1,403 personnel) were Speech & Language Therapists. This figure represents a 10.3% (113 WTE, 126 personnel) increase over December 2019.

• 0.8% (1,109 WTE, 1,225 personnel) were Psychologists. This figure represents a 10.5% (105 WTE, 111 personnel) increase over December 2019.
