PQ 25168/22: To ask the Minister for Health the estimated full-year cost to reduce the two-year waiting list for cancer genetic screening

Dear Deputy Murnane O'Connor,

Testing for inherited cancer-causing genes is most commonly carried out following assessment and discussion with a genetic counsellor, either at the Cancer Genetics Service at St James's Hospital or the Department of Clinical Genetics, at CHI at Crumlin. All referrals received are clinically triaged by a consultant geneticist and appointments allocated accordingly. Both services have made concerted efforts (e.g. through virtual appointments and waiting list initiatives) to reduce waiting times, from a peak of approximately 24 months, to 12-18 months for a routine appointment. A separate pathway in place, with specified turnaround times, for those patients with cancer in whom such a gene test is carried out to determine choice of drug treatment.

Continued investment in cancer genetics is required to further reduce waiting times and to build a comprehensive genetics and genomics service, given its growing role in patient care. This is acknowledged in the work currently underway on the development of a National Genetics and Genomics Strategy, which will make recommendations in relation to the required investment in areas such as new clinical pathways, infrastructural needs, workforce and training.
