Dear Deputy Hourigan,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Questions, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response.

Primary Care can confirm that 1220 children were transferred from the voluntary agencies as part of the Progressing Disability Services for Children and Young People programme in Cork Kerry Community Healthcare (CKCH). Primary care has maintained a record of interventions as provided to children post transfer.

The breakdown of services requested for the children transferred is as follows:-

Primary Care sees children with disability non-complex needs, waiting lists are not typically maintained according to specific diagnosis or diagnostic cohort as might be categorised as neuro-divergent. An exception to same is numbers waiting for autism diagnostic assessment of which there are 1209 children waiting at present. Of the 1209 total waiting on an Autism assessment 3 children are from the group transferred from the Disability Teams in April 2021.

Primary Care has focused the initial intervention emphasis for children with autism on parent support programmes. One to one interventions are embedded to main stream services as appropriate and this is not separately tracked. Primary care is involved in ongoing development of pathways to respond to childrens needs

Primary care with exception of bespoke diagnostic pathways sees all children based on needs and does not record of interventions by way of diagnostic cohorts and cannot accordingly provide the data set in the format as requested.
