Dear Deputy Connolly,

The National Ambulance Service (NAS) has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Questions which you submitted to the Minister for response.

The decommissioning of NAS vehicles is managed by the NAS Fleet and Logistics function in line with the HSE's National Financial Regulations (NFR 06 - Fixed Assets and Capital Accounting). The HSE does not have any plans to outsource this function.

In keeping with international practice for emergency ambulance services, the NAS Fleet & Equipment Replacement Policy 2021 – 2026, provides for a five years or 350,000kms replacement programme for Emergency Ambulances (whichever comes first).

All the above commissioned vehicles are currently in service. The confirmed number of commissioned vehicles for 2022 in all three categories will be available at year end 2022. 35 further Emergency ambulances are awaiting registration and entry into service in 2023.
