PQ4892.22: To ask the Minister for Health the number of people screened by CervicalCheck in each of the past ten years.

Dear Deputy,

I refer to the above Parliamentary Question.

The total number of persons screened by CervicalCheck - at either primary care or colposcopy - in each of the past ten years is shown in the table above.

Despite the many restrictions the pandemic placed on our operations, the programme has been up to date with invites for screening since 2021 and is issuing result letters in line with the KPI of four weeks in 95% of cases.

Please note that in March 2020 cervical screening in Ireland changed from cytology screening (smear test) to HPV cervical screening. The figures in this table are therefore not the number of smear tests but the total number of persons screened (either cytology-led or HPV-led screening) in this time period.

I would like to take this opportunity to let you know that this year the NSS has joined forces with the National Cancer Control Programme and National Immunisation Office to launch Ireland's roadmap to eliminate cervical cancer.

<u>Ireland's roadmap</u> shows the strides made so far towards this global goal, and signposts the future direction we will take, breaking this ambitious journey into achievable stages. The global goals have been developed by the World Health Organization and set key targets that all

countries are asked to strive towards in HPV vaccination, cervical screening and early treatment. Ireland is one of the first countries to commit to cervical cancer elimination.
