To ask the Minister for Health if the results of a pilot scheme which was launched on 1 October 2022 was a feasibility study of the ambulance service bringing patients to Mallow General Hospital instead of C.U.H. Cork city; and if he will make a statement on the matter. -Pat Buckley

Dear Deputy Buckley,

The Health Service Executive (HSE) National Ambulance Service (NAS) has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Questions, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response.

The Medical Assessment Unit (MAU) pathway for 112/999 patients introduced in January 2023 in Roscommon University Hospital and Ennis Hospital was first successfully trialled in Mallow General Hospital in 2022. It allows stable medical patients that meet the agreed clinical criteria to be treated in a Model 2 hospital. A total of 29 patients were transported to Mallow General Hospital instead of Cork University Hospital during the three month trial.

The MAUs launched in hospitals treats patients referred by GPs, out of hours services (ShannonDoc, WestDoc etc.), and now National Ambulance Service paramedics. It is essential that unwell medical patients do not attend the MAU without a referral.

These pathways will result in patients receiving medical treatment in a hospital closer to their home, will reduce patient presentations to Emergency Departments and will release ambulances more quickly to respond to other emergency calls. 112/999 patients that do not meet these clinical criteria will continue to be transported to Emergency Departments for assessment and treatment.

The HSE will closely monitor the impact of the pathways and consider further MAUs in relevant hospitals.
