PQ 35965/23: To ask the Minister for Health the funding streams available for diabetes care for women with gestational diabetes mellitus; and if he will make a statement on the matter

Dear Deputy Phelan,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the above Parliamentary Questions, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position on the various areas and issues you raised.

The HSE annual planning process is the mechanism under which service priorities are identified and prioritised. The annual estimates process is the first step in the annual planning process. As part of this process the HSE undertakes a review of its services and resources and communicates its requirements and priority areas to the Department of Health. As per Table 4 of the HSE Annual Service Plan, funding of 2.3m was provided in 2023 for multiple diabetes initiatives.

Care for women with gestational diabetes mellitus is a priority specialist area named in the National Maternity Strategy 2016-2026 and the associated implementation action plan. The National Women and Infants Health Programme is responsible for the implementation of the Strategy and has made considerable investment in this area of care for women over the last number of years. As highlighted in the table below, dedicated resources have been put in place across the maternity infrastructure to support pregnant women diagnosed with gestational diabetes.
