Dear Deputy Smith,

The Health Service Executive (HSE) has been requested to reply directly to you in the context of the following Parliamentary Question, which was submitted to this Department for response.

PQ 37091/23

To ask the Minister for Health the number of home care and home help hours funded in 2022, and 2023, respectively; the amount not utilised due to staffing shortages; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

The Home Support Service is funded by Government to deliver a volume of service each year as approved in the HSE National Service Plan. It is a non-statutory service and access to the current service is based on assessment of the person's needs by the HSE, having regard to the available resources and competing demands for the service. The volume and type of service provided to each client is based on individually assessed care needs and will vary dependent on the needs identified and the resources available to meet those needs.

As of end of December 2022 **20,792,772** Home Support hours were delivered nationally to **56,162** people .As of end of June 2023 YTD (latest available preliminary data) **10,548,049** Home Support hours were delivered nationally to **53,579** people an increase on hours delivered by of 3.7 % when compared to the same period last year. On 30 June 2023, the total number of people assessed and waiting on funding approval was **zero**, while the total number of people assessed and waiting for a carer to be assigned stood at **6,020**.

Demand for home support continues to increase due to population growth and the increasing dependency of the growing numbers of people aged ≥80 years, within the over 65 years' cohort. In the context of increasing demand, priority is given to those being discharged from acute hospitals who are in a position to return home with supports and to those in the community with acute needs. Funding approval is expedited across the system to ensure minimum waiting times. While there may be delays between the approval of funding and the availability of carers to commence delivery of home support hours in certain regions, significant work is underway to address these challenges. The HSE advertises on an ongoing basis for Health Care Support Assistants (HCSAs) and recruits as many suitable candidates where possible.
