Re PQ No 2590/25. To ask the Minister for Health if she will provide a breakdown of palliative care services nationally, by regional health area, with an outline of the type and duration of service offered, and, in each instance, the funding commitment and the population size served by the service, in tabular form

Dear Deputy Quaide,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to reply directly to you above referenced parliamentary question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health.

In Ireland, specialist palliative care services are delivered by the HSE in partnership with voluntary agencies to provide integrated, high quality and accessible palliative care to patients and their families. Specialist palliative care is provided by multidisciplinary teams in acute hospitals, specialist palliative care inpatient units (Hospices) and in patients own homes by community specialist palliative care teams across all six HSE Health Regions.

There are currently 14 specialist palliative care inpatient units (Level 3 Hospices) providing a total of 276 beds across the country. In 2024 there were 4,711 admissions to specialist palliative care inpatient units.

There are 32 specialist palliative care community (home care) teams covering all 26 counties in the Republic of Ireland. The specialist palliative care community teams work in close partnership with GP's and primary care teams to provide expert palliative care to both adults and children. In 2024 community palliative care teams provided care to an average of 4,259 patients each month in their own homes.

Specialist Palliative Care is also provided in 37 acute hospitals across all of HSE Health Regions. In 2024 approximately 16,700 patients received specialist palliative care in acute hospitals.

Children with palliative care needs also receive palliative care in the community via a shared care approach involving Paediatricians, Community Specialist Palliative Care Teams, GP's and Clinical Nurse Coordinators working collaboratively to care for the child and the family in the home setting. This model of care is in place across all Health Regions and is supported by the voluntary sector including LauraLynn Children's Hospice, Irish Cancer Society and Jack and Jill Foundation who provide additional in-home nursing and respite supports for families.

In line with your request I have included a table below detailing the palliative care budget and population of each Health Region. It includes details of the specialist palliative care providers (both HSE and S38) who deliver specialist palliative care in each region as described above across acute hospitals, hospices and in the community.
