**“To ask the Minister for Children; Equality; Disability; Integration and Youth the reason funding to further develop services in Cork and Kerry for residential care for persons with disabilities has not been allocated; and if she will make a statement on the matter.”**

Dear Deputy Kenny,

The Health Service Executive has been requested to respond to your parliamentary question submitted to the Minister for Children; Equality; Disability; Integration and Youth for response.

HSE South West is funded on an annual basis and this generally includes additional funding for a small number of emergency places each year. As a commitment to multi-annual funding is not provided, it is not possible to plan for the development of residential houses. A funding commitment is required in order to develop these services with the not for profit service providers operating in Cork and Kerry in conjunction with the local authority where relevant.

HSE South West welcomes reference in the Programme for Government, to the exploration of multi-annual funding for the disability sector. On receipt of confirmation of multi-annual funding HSE South West will work with the not for profit providers in Cork and Kerry to ensure residential services are developed to meet the demand. There are 600 people currently awaiting residential placements in Cork and Kerry who will benefit should the Government allocate multi-annual funding to HSE South West to address the deficit in the quantum of residential places.
