PQ41096/25: To ask the Minister for Health the number of persons screened for cancer in the State in each of the past ten years; the types of cancer screened for; and the annual screening target in each of those years, in tabular form.

Dear Deputy,

I refer to the above Parliamentary Question. Please note that we regularly publish data on numbers screened in our <u>programme reports</u> and <u>activity and performance data</u>. Annual screening targets are published each year in the HSE's *National Service Plan*, which is available on hse.ie.

About BreastCheck

BreastCheck is Ireland's free breast screening programme. We screen women who have no symptoms of breast cancer so that we can find and treat breast cancer at the earliest possible stage. We provide access to appropriate care for those who need further tests and treatment. We work to make BreastCheck services accessible to all; for example, providing longer or group appointments, and information in braille and additional languages.

The following table shows the number of women screened by BreastCheck from 2015 to 2024, and the screening target for each of those years.

CervicalCheck

CervicalCheck offers free primary HPV cervical screening every three years to women and people with a cervix aged 25 to 29; and every five years to those aged 30 to 65 years.

Once eligible, it is up to each person to make an appointment with a registered sample taker. Women can check if they are eligible for their free screening test here.













The table below shows the number of women screened by CervicalCheck from 2015 to 2024, and the screening target for each of those years. The move to HPV cervical screening in 2020 involved changes to <u>screening intervals</u>. These changes created fluctuations in the numbers of people invited for screening each year following the introduction of HPV cervical screening.

BowelScreen

BowelScreen offers free bowel screening to people aged 59 to 70 every two years. The primary objective of BowelScreen is to reduce people's risk of developing bowel cancer, by detecting and removing pre-cancerous adenomas in the lining of the bowel. If bowel cancer is found early through screening, it's easier to treat and there's a better chance of recovery.

The following table shows the number of people screened by BowelScreen from 2015 to 2024, and the screening target for each of those years. In October 2023, we began offering BowelScreen to people aged 59 to 69, and this year, we have expanded the age range to people aged 59 to 70. As the age range expands, target screening numbers increase.
