The NCCP have developed a National Breast Cancer GP Referral Guideline (2021) outlining which patients with signs and symptoms should be referred to a symptomatic breast disease clinic. These guidelines are not age specific. They can be found here:

Referrals to SBD clinics are triaged by clinicians. Within the SBD clinics, a patient may receive a triple assessment. This means they are assessed by a breast surgeon and may receive additional tests including a mammogram and/or ultrasound, a core biopsy or fine needle aspiration. What tests are performed depends on the clinical findings of the initial assessment. It should be noted that not all patients who attend the SBD clinic require triple assessment.
