<p>There are 94 applicants in county Sligo approved in the current year for Home Help/ Home Support Service. This does not include Leitrim.</p> <p>In Sligo there are 156 applicants on the waiting list. Of this number there are 86 applicants waiting new service and 70 applicants waiting additional hours.</p> <p>The average length of time that an applicant has to wait to receive a package is 3 months based on calculating the longest and shortest time waiting for a package.</p> <p>The longest length of time an applicant has had to wait in 2019 is 5 months.</p> <p>Following receipt of an application for Home Help the PHN is notified by the Home Support Coordinator and the PHN assesses the clients need using the CSAR. On receipt of the CSAR assessment and request for service the completed documentation is brought to the Home Support Governance Group by the Home Support Coordinator. The Home Support Governance Group meet each Wednesday to review all applications for Home Support and decisions are made using the outcome of the CSAR assessment. Where funding is unavailable the prioritisation</p>		

score as determined by the PHN is applied and the applicant is put on a waiting list awaiting funding. There is a commitment to ensure all returned hours are to be recycled while ensuring no overspend in the Home Support budget.

<p>Dunsheany House, Carndonagh is being provided through the Capital Assistance Scheme (CAS) by Donegal County Council and Apex Housing Association.</p> <p>The property has four bedrooms and an adjacent one-bedroom apartment, and is currently under internal commission by the HSE.</p> <p>The local multi-disciplinary team is in the process of reviewing compatible persons from the Inishowen area to establish their suitability to live in the property.</p> <p>The outcome of this review will inform staffing and funding requirements for the facility.</p> <p>On completion of this process an application for registration will be submitted to HIQA, and pending HIQA approval, the HSE will then be in a position to confirm the date of occupancy of the property.</p>

In 2019, the HSE aims to provide a total of 17.9 million home support hours to 53,000 people across the country, an increase of 700,000 hours on last year. The overall funding allocation for home support services has risen from €306 million in 2015 to €446 million in 2019. Despite this year on year increase in funding, the demand for new and additional home care supports has also increased, in line with a rise in the number of people aged over 65 and the corresponding additional need for home care supports. The level of activity and associated costs in relation to home support is continually monitored to ensure that those with the greatest needs are prioritised and supported.

Donegal Home Care Service will continue to work diligently to ensure the resources available are used efficiently and maximised for the benefit of older persons in the community, whilst remaining within the confines of the designated annual budget.

How many are waiting for Home Help Support that has been approved but the Home Help Support has not been supplied and the reason why.	Cllr M Kilcoyne
<p>At present there are 1856 individuals receiving a Home Support service across County Mayo. In April 48 new clients received a Home Support service and in May 44 new clients were provided with a service.</p> <p>The number of individuals in Mayo waiting for Home Help Support that has been approved but the service has not been provided is 341. This is made up of 327 clients waitlisted for a new service with an additional 14 people waiting on additional Home Support hours.</p> <p>Home Support is implemented based on prioritised need (not a recycling system) within HSE Community Healthcare West's available resources and is a discretionary service to support Older People to remain in their own homes where possible. All applicants who are deemed of sufficient priority to meet the implementation threshold are approved for care to be put in place. Where it is determined that an applicant requires Home Support but due to the lack of available resources it is not possible to implement care at that time the applicant is placed on a waiting list. Once the building is handed over by the contractor, the equipping/commissioning of the unit should take a further two months to complete before the 60-bed block is ready to start admitting patients.

The total capital cost of this project is estimated to be €19.5 million. This is a significant project for the Midwest region that will begin to address the acknowledged shortfall in bed capacity and UL Hospitals Group will make every effort to ensure the project is delivered as soon as possible.

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The Pathology Laboratory, Sligo University Hospital send our tests for Lyme disease (*Borrelia Burgdorferi*), to the National Virus Reference Lab (NVRL) in Dublin. They carry out a screening test for Lyme disease. All positives and equivocal screening tests are then sent to the Rare and Imported Pathogens Laboratory (RIPL), in the U.K. for testing for the more common strains that are involved in Lyme disease. Each region usually tests for the more common strains for their particular region or country.

Lyme disease can be difficult to diagnose by blood test, as there can be different phases of the disease. This is why testing usually requires a number of tests over a period of time.

Due to the low incidence of Lyme disease in Ireland (estimates around 200 people have a positive blood test each

year) testing for specific strains of Lyme disease take place in a centralised testing area to ensure quality and proficiency is maintained.

The Physiotherapist post in Connemara is vacant since the end of April. It has been offered to and accepted by a Physiotherapist who is ready to take up duty once approval is given to proceed with their appointment to the role.

The Islands Physiotherapist post will become vacant at the end of June. It has also been offered and accepted by another Physiotherapist who is ready to take up duty once approval is given to proceed with their appointment to the role.

The waiting list is prioritised on the basis of clinical need. Those considered the most urgent clinically are being offered appointments in St Francis Primary Care Centre in Newcastle, Galway. All other patients remain on the waiting list. Clients who require a domiciliary visit are also being prioritised and those with the greatest clinical need are being seen.

There are currently 44 people on the waiting list awaiting HSE Home Care Support (Home Help) services in Connemara and the Aran Islands – 33 new clients and 11 clients waiting on additional Home Support hours.

The longest person on the waiting list is waitlisted since April 2017.

The Budget allocation for Home Support encompasses all of the Community Healthcare West Region (incorporating Galway, Roscommon and Mayo). As such, there is no ring fenced annual budget for Home Support services for Connemara. The Budget allocation in 2019 for Home Support across Community Healthcare West is €47,652,367.

In respect of the spend on Private Home Care Support providers within Connemara, this cost, like the Home Support Budget allocation is not calculated for a specific area within Community Healthcare West but included in the overall expenditure for the provision of Home Support services across the region. Across County Galway approximately 70% of Home Support is provided through agencies and 30% from directly employed HSE Home Care Support Assistants.

The HSE last advertised positions for Home Care Support Assistants in Connemara in December 2017.

The allocation of Home Care Support to new applicants is not currently suspended within Connemara. Home Care Support is provided to clients across Community Healthcare West within the available budget and accordingly there may be reductions across the region should the expected budget allocation be reduced.

If patient's have been charged this additional fee incorrectly how do the HSE intend refunding this cost to patients? How does the HSE intend to remedy this issue going forward?	Cllr Ó Cualáin
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Under the terms of the current agreement, GPs are required to provide eligible patients with "all proper and necessary treatment of a kind usually undertaken by a general practitioner and not requiring special skill or experience of a degree or kind which general practitioners cannot reasonably be expected to possess". Routine blood tests, which are deemed clinically necessary by the patient's GP are comprehended by this scope of service. It is of course a matter for the treating GP to determine in the case of each individual patient what is proper and necessary care. In circumstances where a GP, in the exercise of his/her clinical judgement, determines that a particular treatment or service requested by a patient is not clinically necessary but the patient still wishes to receive same, it is at the GPs discretion as to whether he/she imposes a charge for providing the service/treatment in question. An example of this might be an asymptomatic patient about whom the GP does not have any clinical concerns requesting a general health screening. Consultation fees charged by GPs outside the terms of the GMS contracts are a matter of private contract between the clinicians and their patients. The HSE does not have any role in relation to the regulation of such fees. The PCRS has issued 2 Circulars to GP contractors (2011 and 2014) to clarify the HSE position on this matter.

Given that the contract with GPs is administered at a local level, eligible persons who have a query or complaint regarding the delivery of service by their GP of choice should, in the first instance, refer their query or complaint to their local health office for appropriate examination, for example if he or she alleges that he/she was charged inappropriately. The role of the Primary Care team, within each CHO, is to investigate, in the first instance, the validity of any claim that a person with eligibility makes regarding charges inappropriately levied by their GP of choice for blood tests undertaken at the GP's practice - *'as part of proper and necessary treatment of a kind usually undertaken by a general practitioner and not requiring special skill or experience of a degree or kind which general practitioners cannot reasonably be expected to possess'*.

Following due process, should the local manager deem that the a person with Medical Card eligibility or GP Visit Card eligibility has been charged inappropriately for routine phlebotomy services, where the samples are taken in the GP's practice as part of the investigation and necessary treatment of patients' symptoms or conditions, the Primary Care Reimbursement Service (PCRS) are notified accordingly. The PCRS will, based on the recommendation of the local manager, make a full refund to the patient concerned and will make a corresponding deduction from the routine payments to the General Practitioner concerned, in accordance with the notification sent to GPs in a previous Circular 011-14.

We have terminated the contracts of a small number of agency staff as part of this process.

Whole Time Equivalent (WTE) are monitored closely by each line manager and reviewed monthly by the Hospital Management Team and Employee Control Committee.

GUH has not cut positions/contracts/hours. Extra control measure have been implemented to manage the hospital’s spend on agency staff and overtime.

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The Tuam Diagnostic Service is being developed in conjunction with Portiuncula University Hospital Ballinasloe. Due to the contract arrangements it is not possible to develop x ray services in Tuam Primary Care Centre. The Diagnostic Service is being developed in Tuam Health Centre. When this service is developed GPs will have direct access to plain x-ray and an ultrasound service.

As it is necessary to complete works on Tuam Health Centre for the delivery of x-ray, it is planned to commence the ultrasound service in Tuam Health Centre once staff are recruited. Accommodation has been identified, equipment purchased and recruitment of the Sonographer progressing. When works are complete on the Health Centre diagnostic area the ultrasound service will move to the Health Centre so that both x-ray and ultrasound are available on the one site. The recruitment process for the Sonographer has commenced, interviews have taken place and the candidates are being processed.

A new Community Nursing Unit for Older People Services is planned for Tuam. It is currently at Design stage with planning permission lodged with Galway County Council in recent days. It will incorporate a Dementia- specific 10 bedded care unit and will be located alongside the new Primary Care Centre in the town of Tuam.

In respect of Disability Services the primary service development being worked on is the reconfiguration of the School Age Team and its co-location with the Early Intervention Team in a single location. This team will have responsibility for the provision of Disability Services to children aged 0 -18 years in the Tuam area.

Currently in the Tuam area, the Old Grove Hospital is for the development of the Community Mental Health Team, which will include a Day Hospital. We are currently awaiting capital funding 2019/2020.

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Recruitment of nurses and midwives is a constant process and continues to be a priority for UL Hospitals Group, we continue to recruit successfully, both nationally and internationally. UL Hospitals Group has been successfully

recruiting nurses over the last 18 months to facilitate the opening of new services including the ED, expanded Dialysis service, additional ICU beds whilst also filling general nursing vacancies.

Nurses are a highly mobile workforce whose skills are greatly in demand at home and abroad. Our recruitment department actively works to fill vacancies as and when they occur on an ongoing basis due to retirements, career breaks, promotion or resignation.

Agency nurses are brought in through the agreed SLA process to cover requirements on a short-term basis, they may also be required to manage surge capacity.

The nursing turnover in UL Hospitals Group is in line with other hospital groups in the country and year on year the recruitment and retention of nursing staff continues to improve. Between May 2018 and May 2019 the Group has 127 more nurses and midwives. Year to date 2019 we have recruited 58 nurses and midwives. We have also a significant reduction in Agency of 41% ytd.

Additionally UL Hospitals Group is a teaching hospital and actively recruits and supports graduate nurses as they start out in their nursing careers. The majority of these Graduates go on to seek career breaks or opportunities to travel and enhance their skills. Our Nursing Management and HR Teams support them in their choices in order to facilitate their return to the hospital at a later stage in their career.
