Dr. Eanna Falvey, Consultant in Sports and Exercise Medicine and Team Doctor to the Irish Senior Rugby Team 2009 - 2015 British & Irish Lions Tours 2013 and 2017

Dr Éanna Falvey MB BCh PhD FRCPI MmedSci (Sports & Exercise Medicine) FFSEM, Director of Sports & Exercise Medicine, Sports Surgery Clinic, Dublin, and Chief Medical Officer, World Rugby.

Dr Falvey has been involved in team coverage for Hurling, Football, Boxing, Rugby and Australian Rules football at elite levels. He graduated from University College Cork before working clinically and researching at Cork University Hospital. He undertook a fellowship in Sports Medicine at the University of Melbourne and completed a PhD at University College Cork.

Dr Falvey was the Team Doctor to the Irish Senior Rugby Team and the Irish Boxing High Performance Unit from 2009-2016- during a time of unprecedented success for both teams. He was doctor to the successful British & Irish Lions tour to Australia in 2013, and was doctor with Munster Rugby for four years from 2003-2007, including the inaugural Heineken cup win in 2006. He was the Medical lead for the British & Irish Lions tour to New Zealand in 2017.

Dr Falvey's work with the Irish Amateur Boxing Association high performance maintained a link to his own sporting past where he was National Amateur Heavyweight and Superheavyweight boxing champion, representing Ireland at the 2001 AIBA World Senior Boxing Championships.

Dr Falvey's current research interests include the biomechanics of groin pain, the use resistance training in mechanical back pain and the role of gut microbiota in athlete health and performance, exercise induced asthma and the inflammatory response to exercise, concussion and rehabilitation. Dr Falvey has co-authored "Clinical Sports Anatomy" and is a contributing author for several books, as well as over 45 peer-reviewed publications.

His professional interests include concussion, chronic groin pain, tendon injury, lower limb overuse injury, performance and injury management in elite team sport.

This model of offering service users and carers an accredited qualification whilst working in partnership with NHS staff on a small step change project has been successfully piloted locally and regionally.
