To ask the Minister for Health the number of international protection applicants who were offered a public health screening in 2022-2024; the number who were not offered a public health screening within that timeframe; the number who attended a public health screening within that timeframe; and if he will make a statement on the matter. -Cian O'Callaghan

Dear Deputy O'Callaghan,

The Health Service Executive have been requested to reply directly to your above Parliamentary Question, which you submitted to the Minister for Health for response. I have examined the matter and the following outlines the position:

The information requested is not routinely collected; material was gathered from several sources in the regional health areas. It was not possible to identify the number of people who were offered a screen and those not offered a screen. However, it was possible to identify the number of people who attended a public health screen in five of the six regional health areas.

For the purpose of this question a public health screen was considered to be screening for TB (disease) and/or BBV (HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C), please see Table 1 below. This aligns with the recommendation in the HSE Refugees and Applicants Seeking Protection (RASP) Service Delivery Model (2023), for screening of both Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection (BOTP) and International Protection Applicants (IPAs). The following categories of screening were collated:

- 1. Screening of adult IPAs: It is important to note that there is no routine systematic public health screening programme in place for refugees and applicants seeking protection in Ireland. However there are a number mechanisms through which screening is carried out. The HSE National Social Inclusion Office funds a Mobile Health & Screening Unit (MHSU), and offers screening for TB and BBV to IPAs >=16yrs old living in IPAS Accommodation Centres, prioritising those centres nationally where the majority of residents come from a WHO High Burden Country for TB.
  Screening is also carried out by location/service for example the National Reception Centre in Balseskin.
- 2. Screening of unaccompanied minors (UAM) seeking international protection
- 3. Screening under Public Health guidance, in response to a case or outbreak of infectious disease (e.g. TB, Hepatitis B)
