Flu vaccine for health and care workers

Every year the flu vaccine is offered to health and care workers to protect them and to prevent the spread of influenza to vulnerable residents and service users. Health and care workers should get the flu vaccine to protect themselves, their residents or service users, and their families.

Health and care workers are 10 times more likely to get flu than the general public, and 1 in every 5 health and care workers get flu each year.

It is expected that both COVID-19 and flu will be circulating this winter, and we know that co-infection with both viruses at the same time can potentially cause significant problems for vulnerable residents or service users, so this year it is very important that health and care workers take the opportunities on offer to get vaccinated as soon as possible in the flu season.

In healthcare settings with high levels of flu vaccination there are lower rates of flu-like illness, reduced hospitalisations and death from flu in people aged 65 and older, and less sick leave in health and care workers.

5 tips to increase health and care worker vaccine uptake

To improve flu vaccination uptake rates of staff in your facility, we recommend managers:



Ensure that all staff are aware of the multiple routes of access to vaccination, including peer vaccination, vaccines clinics on site, local vaccination clinics, GP practices and community pharmacies.



Regularly communicate updates to staff about flu and vaccination clinic times, for example, by weekly newsletters, email/text reminders, or via your facility's website and social media posts.



Have HSE information materials like posters and leaflets on display in your facility.



For staff not able to attend the organised flu vaccination clinics in their place of work, signpost to their GP or community pharmacy, where the flu vaccine can be given. Use the **Pharmacy Finder** on HSE website: <u>https://www2.hse.ie/conditions/flu/pharmacies-flu/</u>



Make sure the health and care workers know the flu vaccine is **free of charge** for them, no matter where they access the vaccine.

What is flu?

Flu is a highly infectious illness caused by the flu virus.

The flu season begins at the start of October



and lasts until the end of April.

People with long-term health conditions may not get sufficient protection from the flu vaccine. They rely on you to be vaccinated to protect them.

Prevent the spread of flu and save lives

High vaccination rates of health and care worker in Europe show lower rates of flu-like illness, hospitalisations and deaths from flu in older people, and a reduction in sick leave among health and care workers.

Flu strains change each year and the the antibodies that protect you fade over time so you need to get the flu vaccine **every** flu season.

Side effects from the vaccine are generally mild and short-lived. Mild symptoms like headache, aches, soreness or redness at the injection site or mild sweating or shivering should all respond to **rest and paracetamol**.
