Flu vaccine for pregnant women

The Quadrivalent Influenza Vaccine (QIV) is recommended for pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy. Pregnant women can get the flu vaccine for free as part of the HSE vaccination programme through participating GPs and Pharmacies.

Pregnant women and their babies are more at risk of serious complications from flu

While anyone can catch flu, pregnant women have a higher risk of developing serious complications if they get flu. They are more likely to need treatment in hospital or the Intensive Care Unit because of flu.

The flu vaccine helps to protect mothers and their babies from the flu during pregnancy. The flu vaccine provides protection to newborn babies during their first six months of life. This is when babies are most likely to be admitted to hospital if they get flu.

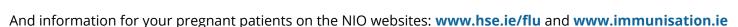
The flu vaccine offers the best protection for pregnant women and their babies from flu

5 Tips to increase uptake of flu vaccine for pregnant women

We recommend participating GP practices and Pharmacies:

- Phone, text or email women who are pregnant to let them know the flu vaccine is available for them free of charge.
- Post on your website and social media accounts that the flu vaccine is available for pregnant women, including clinic times.
- Have HSE information materials like posters and leaflets on display in your practice or pharmacy.
- Consider recommending the vaccine to pregnant women who are attending your practice or pharmacy for another reason, if approapriate.
- Talk to pregnant women about the flu vaccine and share the **Flu Facts**.

Spread the flu facts, not the influenza virus



Pregnant women are at an increased risk of serious complications of flu such as pneumonia or bronchitis. Pregnant women who become sick with flu are also more likely to need treatment in hospital or the Intensive Care Unit.



Getting the flu during pregnancy can significantly increase the risk of premature birth, and even stillbirth. Babies born to women who are hospitalised with flu are four times more likely to be born prematurely or to have a low birth weight. Source: (K Newsome et al)



Newborn babies are more at risk of becoming seriously ill from flu. Babies less than 6 months have the highest rate of hospitalisation and death from flu.



Getting the flu vaccine can reduce the risk of a pregnant woman being hospitalised with flu by about 40%. Source: (MG Thompson et al)



The flu vaccine helps to reduce the risk of giving birth prematurely or have a low birth weight baby. Getting the flu vaccine while pregnant can help to reduce the risk of stillbirth by about 50%. Source: (AK Regan et al)



Getting the flu vaccine during pregnancy helps to protect babies from flu in their first six months of life. This is when babies are most likelt to be admitted to hospital because of flu.



The flu vaccine is safe for pregnant women and cannot give you the flu. Flu vaccines have been given to millions of pregnant women all over the world, and has been given in the US for almost 60 years.



The flu vaccine can be given at any stage during pregnancy. Pregnant women are at risk of severe illness from flu at any stage of pregnancy, so the sooner they get the flu vaccine the sooner they are protected from flu.



The flu season starts at the beginning of October and lasts until the end of April. For women who are pregnant through two flu seasons, two flu vaccines, one in each season, are needed.



Pregnant women can get the flu vaccine with other vaccines recommended during pregnancy like the COVID-19 or whooping cough vaccines at the same time or at any time interval.
