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Welcome to Bulletin 69 from the HSE National Immunisation Office.

Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 (adapted protein subunit vaccine)

The Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 booster COVID-19 vaccine will be available in HSE Vaccination Clinics only from 18th December 2023.

Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 adapted vaccine is now authorised across the EU. The European Commission granted a marketing authorisation on 31st October 2023.

This medicinal product is subject to additional monitoring. This will allow quick identification of new safety information. Healthcare professionals are asked to report any suspected adverse reactions to the HPRA.

The vaccine does not require dilution. Once the multidose vial is punctured, the vaccine should be used immediately. If not used, it may be kept for a single period between +2°C to +25°C and used within six hours.

If more than five 0.5ml doses can be safely and accurately withdrawn from a vial, they can be used as valid vaccines.

Licensed indications

Active immunisation to prevent COVID-19 caused by SARS-CoV-2 virus in individuals 12 years of age and older.

NIAC Recommendations

Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 vaccine is recommended for booster doses only (not for use in primary immunisation courses).

If there is a contraindication or precaution to an adapted mRNA vaccine, or a person has chosen not to receive an adapted mRNA COVID-19 vaccine booster, Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 may be used as an alternate COVID-19 booster vaccine.

Myocarditis and **pericarditis** are very rare side effects of both mRNA vaccines and Nuvaxovid, occurring predominantly after the second dose and in males under 30 years of age. If a vaccinee has a history of myocarditis or pericarditis after an mRNA COVID-19 vaccine their Cardiologist should be consulted before offering Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 vaccine.

Pregnancy: There is more limited experience of Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 in those who are pregnant, and the vaccine should only be considered when the potential benefits outweigh the potential risks.

The Nuvaxovid XBB.1.5 vaccine is only available from HSE Vaccination Clinics.

LAIV influenza vaccine (2023/2024 influenza season)

From December 4th 2023 the Department of Health, has provided funding to the HSE to extend the Quadrivalent Live Attenuated Influenza (LAIV) vaccine programme free to **all children aged 2 to 17 years** <u>inclusive</u>.

The injectable QIV (Influvac Tetra) can be used for children for in the following scenarios:

- a child aged 2-17 years in an at-risk group and is contraindicated LAIV or has an aversion to taking the nasal LAIV that makes giving the LAIV vaccine very difficult or
- in a child aged 6 months to < 2 years and in an at-risk group

The aim of the childhood LAIV flu vaccine programme is to reduce:

- · morbidity and mortality from influenza in children
- transmission of influenza to the elderly and persons in risk groups
- the number of hospital admissions
- · transmission to health care workers in families with children
- absenteeism of children from school and their parents from work

The MMR Vaccine Catch-up Programme

There has been an increase in measles cases internationally and in Europe. In August 2023, a small number of measles cases were reported in Ireland, the first outbreak since 2019. The MMR vaccine provides the best protection against catching measles and preventing outbreaks.

The HSE is now offering an opportunity for General Practitioners with capacity to opt-in to an MMR Catch-up Programme for their unvaccinated or incompletely vaccinated patients aged 10 years old and younger this Winter 2023. Those eligible for MMR vaccination under the programme are:

Children aged between 14 months and 10 years old inclusive who did not receive the MMR vaccine when they were 12 months old, and/or age 4-5 years old in junior infants.

Therefore, any child aged between 14 months and 10 years old (inclusive) who is not age appropriately vaccinated with the MMR vaccine (i.e., who has missed one or both of their MMR vaccines) is eligible for this catch-up campaign.

Rubella immunity

Anyone who has documented evidence of receiving one MMR vaccine are considered immune to rubella infection irrespective of rubella serology. Serology is not recommended after the MMR vaccine as it may not be accurate.

If a woman has documented evidence of having received 1 dose of a rubella-containing vaccine, *irrespective of rubella serology*, no further rubella (MMR) vaccine is necessary.

Two doses may be needed for protection against measles and mumps.

Therefore any woman who has documented evidence of having received one MMR vaccine is considered immune to rubella infection.





Common Queries

Can the LAIV vaccine be given to adults who request it?

The LAIV vaccine is not licensed for anyone aged 18 years or older and so is contraindicated in anyone aged 18 years or older.

Can children aged 2 to 17 inclusive have the IM QIV vaccine if the child's parent requests it?

No, the Influvac Tetra IM QIV vaccine is not available free as part of the children's flu vaccine programme unless the LAIV vaccine is contraindicated.

Can parents now attend their GP for the MMR vaccines due in Junior infants?

No, the MMR Vaccine Catch-up Programme is only for children who have missed the MMR schedule at the recommended times and does not replace the Junior Infants School Immunisation Programme.

If parents are unsure about their child's vaccination history, what can they do?

Parents can contact their local health office for their child's MMR vaccination records.
