

WORKBOOK FOR COMPLETION OF NATIONAL SCHOOL VISION AND HEARING SCREENING METRICS

Background

Under Section 66 of the 1970 Health Act the health service is obliged to provided vision and hearing screening for all children attending Primary Schools.

Registered Public Health Nurses (RPHNs) working as part of the PHN team under the governance of the director of public health nursing provide this screening service.

Each Director of Public Health Nursing (DPHN) area has a dedicated team of RPHNs that work within the school service providing vision and hearing screening and in some cases also providing an immunisations service. Currently some DPHN areas have a designed local/regional school activity return, which the school PHN completes and returns monthly or annually as agreed.

Currently there are no national standardised returns for vision and hearing school screening. There are no national key performance indicators relating to vision and hearing school screening carried out by PHN's.

Development and piloting of national metrics and definitions for school vision and hearing

The development and implementation of these standardised national metrics and definitions came about as a result of significant consultation with school nurses across the country during 2021 and 2022 by the national lead for PHN services.

In Q4 2021 a working group was established to pilot and test the school vision and hearing metrics. The group membership was composed of DPHNs, ADPHNs with responsibility for school screening, School RPHNs, the National Healthy Childhood Programme and national metrics technical group.

In Q1 2022 the metrics and definitions were piloted and tested in two DPHN areas. The feedback from the pilot contributed to the final draft of metrics which will be introduced into all DPHN areas from Sept 2022 (Appendix I and II). This roll out was delayed as the NHCP had planned a review of the school screening service. To date this review has not taken place and in the interim these school metrics will be released for roll out in September 2024.

Education and Training for PHN's providing vision and hearing screening

There are no national standardised training programmes in hearing and vision school screening for RPHNs.

Work is ongoing at national level to develop standardised training content for school RPHNs in vision and hearing screening.

Bespoke education/training programmes are delivered locally and regionally and are provided by the specialist ophthalmology and audiology teams attached to the community or acute hospital services. Refresher training for newly appointed school RPHNs is facilitated locally.

National Standards for Vision and Hearing Screening

Vision and hearing screening by PHN's is underpinned by national guidance as follows:

School Screening Cohorts

The Public Health Nursing Service undertakes hearing and vision school screening on an annual basis by targeting **students** *in the School Hearing and Vision Screening Programme cohort as part of the* School Entry Hearing Screening Programme.

The School Hearing and Vision Screening Programme Cohort includes students enrolled in:

- 1. Primary school junior infants
- 2. Special schools of junior infant class age equivalence (note some areas do not screen in special schools)
- 3. Home Schooled Programme i.e. when a child is educated at home rather than school. This is a constitutional right of parents enshrined in law under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000. (Home schooled children are required to register with Tusla from the age of 6 years to 18 years). Only children whose parents contact the PHN service will be screened. *

(Vision Metrics V1 to V5 and Hearing Metrics H1 to H5)

*(When parents contact the Alternative Education Assessment and Registration Service in Tusla to request a home education application form, they are sent a Frequently Asked Questions information sheet as part of the application form pack. Question 5 in the FAQ document relates to entitlement to benefits:

5. Does my child have the same entitlement to benefits as a child attending a recognised school? Yes. All children and young people on the section 14 Register are entitled to the same status as a child receiving their education in a recognised school. Therefore, they are entitled to benefits in line with children attending a Department of Education and Skills School, such as; child benefit, eye and hearing tests, vaccination programmes etc. For more information in relation to these entitlements, please contact the relevant government department.)

Children outside the cohort

Children in classes other than the School Entry Hearing and Vision Screening Programme cohort may also be offered a PHN hearing and vision screen. All new children into the school in this academic year irrespective of child's age or class where there is an unknown or undocumented testing history should be offered screening. Metrics in respect of these children are also be collected and returned in the excel workbook.

(Vision Metrics V6 to V8 and Hearing Metrics H6 to H8)

Excel resources to support activity returns

- 1. A standardised excel spreadsheet for the annual return of all vision and hearing screening carried out in the previous school year (returns by network). The completion of this return is mandatory and should be returned to the DPHN office by the 10th of Sept of each year. This return is named Annual School Screening Metrics.
- 2. A standardised excel spreadsheet for the ongoing collection of vision and hearing metrics throughout the year. This is known as **School Screening Activity Tracker**. The use of this spreadsheet is optional. However, if you choose to use an alternative collection method please ensure that the activity collected is in line with the metrics and definitions in the **Annual School Screening Metrics** collection template.

Instructions for School PHNs commencing national data collection in Sept 2024

- **1.** Familiarise yourself with this workbook and the **Annual School Screening Metrics** metric wording and definitions. There should be one workbook for each network.
- Agree which data collection tool will be used to collect ongoing vision and hearing screening. (If not the optional School Screening Activity Tracker then ensure alignment with the national metrics and definitions).
- **3.** The **School Screening Activity Tracker** is the minimum dataset for school screening. Individual areas may collect and return additional information as requested by a DPHNADPHN.
- 4. The totals from vision and hearing screening carried out in the school and clinic are transferred from the School Screening Activity Tracker into the Annual School Screening Metrics when the screening for a particular school is completed. This entry can be done once school screening is complete or at the end of the year when all screening is complete before submission for 10th Sept. The schools screened in academic year 24/25 will be returned in September 2025.
- 5. All vision and hearing screening carried out in the school setting and health centre/PCC location are counted for the purposes of these metrics.

- 6. In the **Annual School Screening Metrics** you only have to enter into the tab named **Vision and Hearing metric returns.** The **summary page** is automatically populated.
- 7. **Annual School Screening Metrics** completed should be sent to line manager before 10th of Sept each year.

Instructions for ADPHN/DPHN completing the annual CIF sheet

- Ensure that returns have been received from schools screening PHNs/Teams per network
- 2. Amalgamate all of the data from these returns. Use a blank **Annual School Screening Metrics** excel sheet to amalgamate all of the returns.
- 3. Enter the information from all the returns data into the tab named **Vision and Hearing metric returns.** The **summary page** is automatically populated.
- **4.** The information from the **Summary Tab** is the information to be transferred to the HSE **CIF sheet**

Appendix I

The Public Health Nursing Service school vision screening programme undertakes vision screening on an annual basis by targeting students in the School Vision Screening Programme cohort.*

The School Vision Screening Programme Cohort includes students enrolled in:

- 1. Primary school junior infants class/classes
- 2. Special schools of junior infant class age equivalence (note some areas do not screen in special schools)
- 3. Home schooled Programme i.e. When a child is educated at home rather than school. This is a constitutional right of parents enshrined in law under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000. (Home schooled children are required to register with Tusla from the age of 6 years to 18 years). Only children whose parents contact the PHN service will be screened)

The vision screening may be undertaken in;

A school setting

or

In a clinic setting if the child is not in attendance on the day of the vision screen or is home schooled

Therefore, the metrics collected are inclusive of all children in the school vision screen programme cohort who had school entry vision screening undertaken by the School Public Health Nurse or area PHN in both of these settings.

This data will be collected by Local Health Office and Community Healthcare Organisation and returned on an annual basis by 10th September each year

Please note that all vision screening carried out in the school or in a clinic setting are counted for the purposes of each named school return including mop up appointments and repeat appointments.

The Public Health Nursing Service school hearing screening programme undertakes hearing screening on an annual basis by targeting **students** *in the School Hearing Screening Programme cohort.**

The School Hearing Screening Programme Cohort includes students enrolled in:

- 1. Primary school junior infants class/classes
- 2. Special schools of junior infant class age equivalence (note some areas do not screen in special schools)
- 3. Home schooled Programme i.e. When a child is educated at home rather than school. This is a constitutional right of parents enshrined in law under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000. (Home schooled children are required to register with Tusla from the age of 6 years to 18 years). Only children whose parents contact the PHN service will be screened)

The hearing screening may be undertaken in;

A school setting

or

• In a clinic setting if the child is not in attendance on the day of the hearing screen or is home schooled

Therefore the metrics collected are inclusive of all children in the school hearing screen programme cohort who had school entry hearing screening undertaken by the School Public Health Nurse or area PHN in both of these settings.

This data will be collected by Local Health Office and Community Healthcare Organisation/LHO and returned on an annual basis by 10th September each year.

Please note that all hearing screening carried out in the school or in a clinic setting are counted for the purposes of each named school return including mop up appointments and repeat appointments.
