Simple Sentences

The simplest of sentences have one noun and one verb. The most basic of sentences have a **noun**, which is the *subject* of the sentence, and **verb**.

Examples of simple sentences include the following:

Joe waited.

"Joe" = (noun) subject, "waited" = verb

Trains go.

"Trains" = (noun) subject, "go" = verb

I looked.

"I" = (noun) subject, "looked" = verb

There are many sentences you can complete with just a **noun** a **verb**.
