A statement about the effectiveness of the approved centre's actions to eliminate, where possible, and reduce physical restraint

Eist Linn has demonstrated a commitment to reducing the use of physical restraint within the approved centre, achieving a reduction in the overall number of episodes of physical restraint from 37 (2023) to 24 (2024). This reduction reflects the centre's ongoing efforts to eliminate, where possible, and minimise the use of restrictive practices.

The Reducing Restrictive Practice Working Group convened quarterly to review all instances of restraint within each period. This group systematically analysed audit findings and developed targeted action plans to address any areas of non-compliance with the Code of Practice on the Use of Physical Restraint in Approved Centres.

Additionally, the Policy Review Group conducted a comprehensive review of both the Physical Restraint Policy and the Reducing Restrictive Practices Policy to ensure full compliance with regulatory standards and best practice guidelines. These collaborative and structured approaches have supported a culture of continuous improvement, prioritising least restrictive interventions and enhancing person-centred care within the service.

A statement about the approved centre's compliance with the code of practice on the use of physical restraint

Eist Linn remains committed to full compliance with the Code of Practice on the Use of Physical Restraint in Approved Centres, ensuring that restrictive practices are only utilised as a last resort and in the safest, most ethical manner.

The Reducing Restrictive Practices Working Group meets quarterly to review and audit all incidents of physical restraint. This process allows for the identification of any areas of non-compliance, with immediate action plans developed to address concerns and implement necessary improvements. The group also collaborates with the multidisciplinary team (MDT) to work through the Colton Assessment, ensuring Eist Linn maintains a proactive and readiness-focused approach to reducing restrictive practices.



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Further enhancing compliance, the centre actively manages mandatory training in Professional Management of Aggression and Violence (PMAV), ensuring all relevant staff receive up-to-date, evidence-based training. Additionally, peer learning sessions were conducted on Professional Management of Challenging Behaviour (PMCB) and Positive Behaviour Support, fostering a culture of continuous learning and improvement.

Eist Linn's Policy Review Group undertakes regular evaluations of both the Physical Restraint Policy and the Reducing Restrictive Practices Policy to align with best practices and regulatory requirements. Through these structured approaches, Eist Linn ensures ongoing compliance, prioritises least restrictive interventions, and promotes a safe, therapeutic environment for all young people in its care.

A statement about the compliance with the approved centre's own reduction policy

Eist Linn remains committed to the ongoing reduction of restrictive practices in line with its Reducing Restrictive Practices Policy. The centre takes a proactive and structured approach to ensuring compliance with this policy, embedding a culture that prioritises least restrictive interventions and promotes a safe, therapeutic environment for young people.

The Reducing Restrictive Practices Working Group meets quarterly to review all incidents of restraint, analyse audit findings, and identify any areas requiring improvement. Action plans are developed to address any issues related to non-compliance, ensuring a responsive and adaptive approach to reducing restrictive interventions.

A key component of this strategy is the centre's engagement with the Colton Assessment, allowing the multidisciplinary team (MDT) to assess and enhance readiness for reducing restrictive practices. Additionally, Eist Linn ensures the proactive management of mandatory training in Professional Management of Aggression and Violence (PMAV), alongside peer learning sessions focused on Professional Management of Challenging Behaviour (PMCB) and Positive Behaviour Support. These initiatives equip staff with the necessary skills to manage challenging situations using the least restrictive means possible.

Eist Linn's Policy Review Group continuously evaluates both the Reducing Restrictive Practices Policy and the Physical Restraint Policy to maintain alignment with best practices and regulatory expectations. Through these combined efforts, Eist Linn demonstrates a sustained commitment to reducing restrictive interventions, fostering a person-centred approach, and upholding the highest standards of care and compliance.
