# Guidance to Support the Resumption of Centre-Based Respite Services for People with Disabilities

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1.0 Introduction

While some respite services continued to provide limited supports throughout the pandemic, others closed completely. Respite Services have been fully operational since August 2020 in line with the **Guidance to Support the**Resumption of Centre-Based Respite Services for People with Disabilities.

The purpose of this document is to provide updates to that <u>original document</u>. Since that guidance was published, Ireland has developed a very successful vaccination programme where over 91% of our population has been vaccinated to date. In addition to that, a booster programme is underway and many people with disabilities have now had three doses of the COVID vaccine. Knowing that the vaccine is effective after the immune response, especially following the booster vaccination and knowing that the vast majority of the population attending Respite Services are now fully vaccinated provides significant reassurance and confidence as Respite Services fully reopen.

The success of the vaccination programme has allowed the country to open back up and ease many of the restrictions that we have lived with for the past twenty months, but the pandemic is not over and we now need to learn to "live" with the virus in our communities. To that end, we are collating the most current infection prevention and control advice and providing the links to those guidances in this document. This update will highlight the areas in the original publication (August 2020) so it should be read **in conjunction** with that with that <u>original document</u>.

The Alignment with HSPC Guidance (1.1), Scope and Purpose (2.0) and Key Principles (3.0) remain the same.

# 2.0 Transmission of COVID 19 - Recap

- Most people get COVID-19 from being close to an infectious person indoors for a quarter of an hour or more
- Direct transmission through the air mainly over short distances (droplet)
   but also over longer distances (airborne) especially in enclosed areas with poor ventilation

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- Contact transmission lands on surface and carried to the nose/mouth/eye on your hands
- Existing Public Health, vaccination and IPC measures remain highly effective in protecting against the new variants of the virus
- Note increased emphasis on ventilation as we have learned more about new variants

#### **3.0 Service User Needs Assessment** (4.0 in original document)

It is important for service managers to know the vaccination status of all service users attending Respite Services (both Influenza and COVID 19) and when their boosters are due, if the individual has not already received it. With regards to this section, a question regarding the **service user's vaccination status** i.e. are they fully vaccinated; does he/she have a booster vaccination, should be added to the Risk Assessment when a person is attending Respite Services.

**All** decisions made regarding the provision of respite to an individual must be based on **individual** risk assessments and the prioritisation criteria (section 4.3 of the original document). If the respite bed is in a location where other residents are living, the risk assessment should also take into account the vaccination status, age, and underlying medical conditions of those residents.

# 4.0 Attendance Log (6.7 in original document) and Visiting

The Attendance Log, which is Appendix X in the original document (August 2020) should be updated to include a check for proof of immunity or vaccination as per the **Normalising Visiting in Long Term Residential Care Facilities (LTRCFs)** (November 10, 2021 for implementation November 15<sup>th</sup> 2021). The term LTRCFs encompasses all congregated care settings where people are intended to remain for extended periods including nursing homes, certain mental health facilities and

A separate document was developed on July 14<sup>th</sup> 2021 which applied to people living in own-door supported accommodation or small group homes. **This** document needs to be updated.

#### 5.0 Management of Contacts of Cases of COVID-19

The Health Protection and Surveillance Unit (HPSC) published National Guidelines for Public Health management of contacts of cases of COVID-19 (V10.4) on 13.12.2021. <a href="https://www.hpsc.ie/a-z/respiratory/coronavirus/novelcoronavirus/guidance/contacttracingguidance/National%20Interim%20Guidance%20for%20contact%20tracing.pdf">https://www.hpsc.ie/a-z/respiratory/coronavirus/novelcoronavirus/guidance/contacttracingguidance/National%20Interim%20Guidance%20for%20contact%20tracing.pdf</a>. These National Guidelines provide updated information on the use of Rapid Antigen Detection Tests (RADTs) and period of restriction for asymptomatic fully vaccinated household contacts of confirmed cases.

## 6.0 Healthcare Workers (HCWs) – COVID 19 household contacts-Public health guidance

People who are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and who are household contacts of a case must:

- Restrict movement for 5 full days from the day on which they are informed that they are a contact
- 2) Receive antigen tests and instructions for use of those tests.

If 5 full days have passed before the person has not completed the recommended self-testing they should continue to follow the recommended schedule of testing but they do not have to continue to restrict movement.







Note that, **derogation** from exclusion from work may apply to fully vaccinated contacts.

# 6.1 Derogation for the Return to Work of HCWs who are Essential for Critical Services

Further to the publication of the HPSC National Guidelines for Public Health management of contacts of cases of COVID-19 (V 10), the HSE Occupational Health Department published Derogation for the Return to Work of Healthcare Workers (HCW) who are Essential for Critical Services (Issue date 22/03/2020 Review date 24<sup>th</sup> Nov 2021) – Guideline Document

This guideline is relevant to "fully vaccinated" asymptomatic HCW who are close contacts. It is appropriate that senior management on site are the decision makers regarding the need to derogate a HCW, following a risk assessment – Appendix 2 of the document. This derogation must be agreed by the HCW.

The HSE Occupational Health Department also issued the **Quick Guide for Healthcare Worker (HCW) Management (V 8)** on 3.12.2021.

https://www.hse.ie/eng/staff/workplace-health-and-wellbeing-unit/covid-19-guidance/quick-guide-for-healthcare-worker-management.pdf . This is a one-page document with guidance on the management of both unvaccinated and fully vaccinated HCWs.

People who are **not fully vaccinated** and who have not had a confirmed diagnosis of COVID-19 in the previous 9 months and who have been identified as contacts of a case of COVID-19 in any setting must:

- 1) Restrict their movements and remain off work for 14 days.
- 2) Exit from restricted movement can happen before 14 days if PCR test result taken day 10 or later does not detect virus.



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#### **7.0 Transport** (8.0 in original document)

The Government Guidance Reframing the challenge, continuing our recovery and reconnecting, which was published in August 2021 set out a 6-week timeframe to allow all transport to resume at 100% capacity by 22.10.2021. This also relates to transport in disability services. Where possible and appropriate for service users, face coverings should continue to be used on transport. All other infection, prevention and control measures must still be observed. When transmission in high in a particular community, it is recommended that family members be encouraged to drive service users to and from Respite Services.

#### 8.0 Ventilation

It is important that there is good air exchange in each room but a balance between comfort, weather and temperature control must be maintained.




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# 9.0 Maintaining a Safe Environment – The Safety Pause

# How safe is the service today- keep connected!

- Is everyone feeling OK today?
- Has everyone received COVID awareness and IPC training?
- Any new staff -what support do they need in the service?
- Have we any risks or concerns in our service today and do our staff know who to speak to?
- What is working well for us as a team?
- What is not working so well?
- Is there one thing we can do to improve safety in our service **today**?







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#### 10.0 Summary of Key Points in this update

- the addition of a question on the service user's evidence of immunity or vaccination, symptom check, and history of travel to the risk assessment prior to admission for respite, as well as any visitor to the respite centre
- importance of service user's COVID and Influenza vaccination status
- all decisions made regarding the provision of respite to an individual must be based on **individual** risk assessments and the prioritisation criteria
- the management of close contacts has changed as per December 13th
- a derogation can be applied to fully vaccinated healthcare workers who are close contacts but are working in an essential service (such as a Respite Centre) as per guidance issued on December 3rd
- transport in disability services is in line with public transport 100% capacity
- need for adequate ventilation





#### 11.0 COVID-19 Protocols and Infection Control Supports

Since the onset of COVID-19 a wealth of support information has been produced to support the public at large and in particular providers of health care services to respond to the many challenges presented by the pandemic in order to contain the virus and prevent it spreading widely.

In regard to Disability services there is a significant repository of support materials available on the HSE website and all Respite.

Service providers should become familiar with the guidance already developed that has a bearing on the provision of disability Respite Services. This guidance includes many Easy Read documents that can be utilised to support interface with disability service users or act as a basis for developing communication that is service user friendly.
