The Accident Report Record designed for employee industrial accidents is inappropriate and does not have a space to record 'action taken'. A separate book is used for 'major incidents'. A Hardback book is used for more 'minor incidents'. There are no written guidelines to differentiate minor/major incidents.
Required Action	One appropriate incident book for all incidents, preferably with a carbon so that a copy is available for resident files.
Timescale	4 weeks from receipt of this report.
Regulation number	 11.2 In every nursing home there shall be provided suitable and sufficient accommodation which meets the minimum standards as follows:— (i) over-bed lamps at each bed accessible to the person and permanent night lighting with dimming facilities;
