THE MEDICAL WORKFORCE ANALYSIS REPORT AND THE MEDICAL RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION REPORT

The Medical Recruitment and Retention Report examines various cohorts of doctors from 2016 as they enter, leave and return to the Irish public health system. The report shows the increasing rate of retention of Higher Specialist Trainees. For doctors who completed Higher Specialist Training in 2019, the rate of retention increased by 4% (from 78% to 82%) between 2023 and 2024.

The retention patterns of doctors who have completed their intern year in Ireland remains similar to previous years. Four out of five interns go on to further training in Ireland. The data also shows a trend of a higher proportion of interns going abroad after internship and longer durations of staying abroad.

The Medical Workforce Analysis Report shows the characteristics and distribution of the medical workforce across the country. Data is presented at national, regional and site level to support decision making by a range of stakeholders. The report shows that there are now 4,620 consultants employed in the public health service. The number of consultants employed has increased from 69.7 per 100,000 of the population to 86.3 per 100,000 over the last 5 years. The number of new consultant posts created has declined from 412 in 2021 to 149 in 2024.

Speaking about the findings, Prof Anthony O'Regan (NDTP) said: "These reports demonstrate the growth in the number of trainees and the retention of these trainees. This growth is required to expand the consultant and GP workforces to meet the demands of our health service."

TOP TIPS FOR NCHD CHANGEOVER



1. ACCESS THE NER PORTAL

Log into your NER Account to process pre-employment screening documentation and access financial supports. Access the NER Portal: <u>https://nchder.ie</u>

2. CHECK YOUR NER ACCOUNT IS ACTIVE

Contact your current Medical Manpower Department to reactivate your NER account. To unlock your account contact <u>dime.team@hse.ie</u>.





3. REVIEW YOUR HIRE FORM AND OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH FORM

Review your Hire Form to check you have:

- Current contact details, next of kin details and bank details. Review your Occupational Health Form to check you have:
- Pre-employment health questionnaire and immunisation documentation up to date.

4. CHECK YOU HAVE COMPLETED MANDATORY TRAININGS

Visit <u>hseland.ie</u> to ensure you have completed all the mandatory trainings required and upload your certificates to your NER Account.





5. SUBMIT YOUR TSS/CCERS APPLICATIONS

With large increases in TSS/CCERS application submissions, submit early to receive timely reimbursement.

6. CHECK YOUR EMPLOYMENT SUMMARY IS CORRECT

In the NER Portal you can view your employment history, pay details and sick leave. You can also check that you are assigned to the correct division of the Medical Council Register.





7. SUBMIT YOUR TRAINING AND CAREER PROGRESSION RECORDS ON E-PORTFOLIO

The E-Portfolio module can be used to track your training and career progression records. You can use it to submit records within the past 6 months for verification.

8. CONSIDER YOUR ANNUAL LEAVE/ STUDY LEAVE/ TRAINING

Review what trainings or days off you may need during your next rotation. Let the manager of the roster at your new position know as soon as possible.





9. VISIT MEDICALCAREERS.IE

We recommend you visit <u>MedicalCareers.ie</u> to understand what to expect in your role. You will also find information on career planning and educational supports and opportunities.
